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for junior senior level courses in religion and society in departments of sociology and religious studies using an unbiased balanced approach the 7th edition of this text continues to offer a sound analysis of religion as a social institution that is interdependent and in constant interaction with other societal units it helps students understand the role and function of religion in society that occur regardless of anyone's claims about the truth or falsity of religious systems the focus is on american religious institutions but includes many examples of the interaction of religion and society in other cultures both historic and contemporary students will encounter major discussions of islam and other non western religions

an expert team of international scholars provide fifty one essays as entry points into the sociological study and understanding of religion and in

depth surveys into its changing forms and content in the contemporary world issues discussed range from ecology to law art to cognitive science crime to health care

sociology of religion represents a documented introduction to the history of sociological thought as applied to religious phenomena it examines both the substantive and functional definitions of religion that are more open pluralistic and not inscribed in a single explanatory horizon or within a single confessional perspective the contributors concerns are carefully written to show all sides of the argument roberto cipriani argues for the simple definition that the sociology of religion is an application of sociological theories and methods to religious phenomena historically close ties between sociology and the sociology of religion exist the slow and uneven development of theory and methods affects the sociology of religion s development but the latter has also benefited from increasing precision and scientific validity other sociological writers agree and disagree about different approaches some assume it is a militantly confessional or anti confessional others remain neutral within their work

many aspects of religion are puzzling these days this 2003 book looks at ways of improving our understanding of religious change by strengthening the links between social theory and the social scientific study of religion it clarifies the social processes involved in constructing religion and non religion in public and private life taking illustrations of the importance of these boundaries from studies of secularisation religious diversity globalisation religious movements and self identity beckford reviews social scientific knowledge about religion and assesses the strengths and weaknesses of a wide range of theoretical attempts to account for religious change and continuity the discussion goes in two directions the first is towards identifying ways in which studies of religion would benefit from taking better account of themes in recent social theory the second is towards identifying reasons for social theorists to pay more attention to the findings of empirical investigations of religion

this timely book aims to change the way we think about religion by putting emotion back onto the agenda it challenges a tendency to over emphasise rational aspects of religion and rehabilitates its embodied visceral and affective dimensions against the view that religious emotion is a purely private matter it offers a new framework which shows how religious emotions arise in the varied interactions between human agents and religious communities human agents and objects of devotion and communities and sacred symbols it presents parallels and contrasts between religious emotions in european and american history in other cultures and in contemporary western societies by taking emotions seriously a sociology of religious emotion sheds new light on the power of religion to shape fundamental human orientations and motivations hopes and fears joys and sorrows loves and hatreds

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this collection of articles explores the relationship between the structure and culture of religion and various aspects of social life in the united states based on both classic and contemporary research in the sociology of religion it highlights a variety of research methods and theoretical approaches in exploring the ways in which religious values beliefs and practices shape the world outside of church synagogue or mosque walls while simultaneously being shaped by the non religious forces operating in that world many readings from drawn popular sources e g newspapers and magazines and although many of the readings are about religion in the christian tradition there are also readings about religion outside the american context e g poland england el salvador nicaragua and beyond the christian tradition e g judaism alternative religions hindu traditions classic sociological definitions of religion belief and ritual religious experience race ethnicity and religion gender and religion social class and

religion sexual identity and religion the secularization debate religious organizations institutions and authority alternative religions media and religion politics and religion science and religion social movements and religion for anyone interested in the sociology of religion or religious perspectives on social issues
